We have received your letter, dated April 19, 1963, in which, on behalf of Mrs. Constance Burnett, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, you made inquiry regarding certain proceedings on the estate of George Daniels, a deceased unallotted Osage Indian.

In reply to an earlier inquiry from you on this same matter, we advised you on April 16, 1963, that the interested parties in the above estate were in the process of negotiating a settlement of their differences. However, information received since that time from our Regional Solicitor, Tulsa, Oklahoma, indicates that settlement negotiations among the parties probably will not be concluded, and that it will be necessary for us to consider the appeal which was filed in the present case. Consideration of that appeal had been suspended because of the apparent intention of the parties to effect a settlement.
