I. BACKEWNAU:

A. The Seminole Tribe is located in Seminole County. This area covers approximately 665 square miles. An estimated 4,350 Seminoles lives within this area. We have Schipples

- living in surrounding counties, Pontotoc, Bughes and Okfuckee. Medical care facilities are inacessible to Indiana located in these grees.
 - B. The closest medical facility to the Tribe is located thirty-two miles away in Shawnee, Oklahoma. This FHS Indian Mealth Center serves approximately thirty-two thousand Indian people representing twenty-seven Tribes. This is an out-patient Clinic, open five days a week. Clinic Hours on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday are 6:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. and on Thursday 12:00 Boom to 8:00 P.M. The PMS Clinic is closed on week-ends and emergency care is through other medical care facilities.
 - C. If hospilization la required, Tribal members must travel to U. S. P. H. S. Indian Mospital. From Wewoka, these facilities are located:

123 Miles to Claremore

143 Miles to Lawton

140 Miles to Tablequah

123 Miles to Talibina 119 Miles to Pamee

- D. When Tribal members are referred, this presents another problem, transportation. They are unable to make it to an Indian Health Center located thirty-two miles away, it is impossible for them to make a long trip.
- E. There are areas of Pontotoc, Coal, Hughes and Pittsburgh Counties, which have no close medical facilities. Even though these counties fall under three different service units, they are too far for the Indian people to get to the Service Unit.

II. PROBLEM:

- A. With only one health center to serve thirty-two thousand people (this figure does not include the Urban Indians). The type care the patients need must be referred to another facility, due to the lack of space, staff and equipment.
- B. Although, contract health care is offered, the needs exceeds the funding for these services.
- C. There is presently a health station at Wetumka opened once a week. Staffed from Shawnee Health Center and a Contract physician. Both the prsent staff and facilities are completely inadequate to provide good medical care.
- D. Transportation from these areas and other out-lying communities proves a hardship on Tribal members to go PHS Health Center or Hospital. Therefore, they go without medical attention, return visits for pre-natal and follow-ups on surgical patients.

III. OBJECTIVES:

- A. This health center would provide service to greatest number of people, not only the Saminole Bation but other Tribes in the areas mentioned that do not have access to a medical facility.
- B. To provide better health care to person served by a care a week health station at Wetumka.
- C. To alleviate traveling distance for out-patient clinic.
- D. With a health center centrally located, surgical, diabetics and pre-natal patients would keep their appointments wheather than cancel due to the waiting time involved.

IV. DISCUSSION:

We, the Seminole Nation, would not be only Tribe to benefit from this health care center. Even with other clinics being established outside of the Service Unit Area, this does not alleviate the problems faced by the Tribe or the Service Unit.

The Tribal leaders see the need for a medical care facility.

With the establishment of health care center, it would

lessen the workload for the Shawnee Service Unit. Serving

a large number of people, Shawnee Service Unit does not

adequately provide quality health care.

Even using all the health resources available to the Tribal members, this does not met the health needs.

PHS Sharmee Indian Health Center has included in their long range plan submitted for Fiscal Year 1973 data necessary for the establishment of Weeoka Realth Center.

This the second time in the past eight years, the Tribe has tried to establish a health facility for this area. The Tribel leaders see the need for these facilities. They have passed two resolutions for trying to meet these health needs.

V. LOCATION:

A. Melausukey Mission Ground: This Tribal ground located Southwest of Seminole, Oklahoms. The Seminole Nation has already constructed a Community Building on this ground. Plans are now being developed to build an Office Building to house all Tribal Organisations as well as supporting agencies.

The City of Seminole is a thriving town, with four elementary schools, one Junior High and one High School.

Also, a Junior College. Several industries have located bere within the last five years.

Seminole is only ten miles from Inter-state 40, which will take you into Oklahoma City or Tulsa or

to say of the beautiful recreation spots in northeastern' Oklahoma.

B. City of Wewoka: The capitol of the Seminole Nation. This town also has serveral industries and is asmaller town than Seminole. It has one elementary, One Junior High and one High School.

Weweks is located fifteen miles south Inter-State 40, which gives you easy access to Oklahoma City, Tulsa or recreation areas in Northeastern Oklahoma.

C. Both committee will work with the Tribe in establishing a health center.

PART II

TRIBAL RESCRIPTIONS - MEALTH CARE

ESTABLISHING THE NEED FOR A HEALTH CLINIC IN THE HEART OF THE SEMINOLE NATION.

. WHEREAS, the Seminole Nation of Oklahoma has been in dire need of Health Care Facilities in this area, and

WHEREAS, the Service Unit at Shawnee carries a heavy work-load, by serving different counties and tribes, and

WHEREAS, it will be to our advantage to have the facilities in our area to reduce the work load, thus serving our people, who are unable to travel this distance, with prompt and immediate attention.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the General Council of the Seminole Nation of Oklahoma, hereby approves the construction of a Health Clinic in this area to serve the Indian People.

APPROVED by the General Council of the Seminole Nation on November 17, 1973, at a special called meeting, at the Council House, Mekusukey Mission Grounds, by a vote of 32 for, 0 against, 0 abstaining, a quorum of 22 Council Members being present.

PART III

PROGRAM PLANS - HEALTH CENTER

This Wewoka Health Center will provide care to an estimated Indian population of 4,995 persons in a 20-mile radius of Wewoka.

In FY 1973 this population must travel to the Talihina or Claremore Hospital, a distance of 107 or 112 miles, respectively, or to the Shawnee Health Center which is 35 miles distance for adequate full time health care. The control health stations at Newoka and Netumka which as a limit control and part, each open one half day per week, started from the Shawnee Health Center and physician. It is planned to close the Wetumka health station when the new Wewoka Health Center is open. It is planned to close the Wetumka health stations.

This planned facility and staffing would permit good quality of ambulatory care to the total Indian population when they need it within a reasonable driving distance.

It is estimated that service will increase after a full year of operation as follows:

1. Total ambulatory care care services - services provided required - 2,618 = 16,853 increase in ambulatory care services after new health center in operation one year

2. Increase in Public Health Nursing Services:

Individual care to = 4,400 patients

Group Services to = 144 groups

- Direct patient care services and preventive mental health activities will be provided by a professionally trained mental health consultant.
- 4. Direct nutritional services can be provided the total Service Area population.
- 5. Total environmental health services can be provided the Service Area population.
- 7. All necessary medically related social services will be provided by qualified social worker.
- 8. Health Education services will be available.

Shawnee Health Center - Service Area

The Shawnee Health Center will provide care to an estimated Indian population of 4,893 persons in a 20-mile radius of Shawnee.

Even though the present Shawnee Health Center is more nearly adequate than any other in the Oklahoma City Area, it is still inadequate to provide quality health care to the service area's population because of its age and floor plan of the facility. In addition, it is estimated that a minimum of \$100,000 will be required to replace all plumbing, electrical and other deficiencies to meet safety standards. Staffing and equipment are also not totally adequate to meet the need.

At present, we are providing about 95 percent of the services expected to be provided in the planned new Shawnee Health Center. However, this does not mean the Shawnee service area population is receiving 95 percent of the services they require. Many of the services being provided at Shawnee presently are to Indian people from other service areas which do not have facilities - most of these people are coming from the Wewoka service area. When the planned Wewoka Health Center is completed, the planned resources for the Shawnee Health Center as follows will permit good quality of ambulatory care to the total Indian population in both the Wewoka and Shawnee service areas when they need it and within a reasonable driving distance.

The statistics in this report was taken from Seminole Nation GER Records. This report shows only about 25% of the people who use the GER Services. With only four GER's on duty at the time, this information was compled it is difficult to serve the entire Indian population.

These statistics are being used to show that transportation and the distance to a medical care facilities has been a factor in getting medical care.

With the CIR Program, the people are becoming more aware of their health problems, therefore; we are faced with problem of imadequate medical care facilities. Inadequate medical care facility meaning not enough space, staff or equipment to meet the heelth moods.

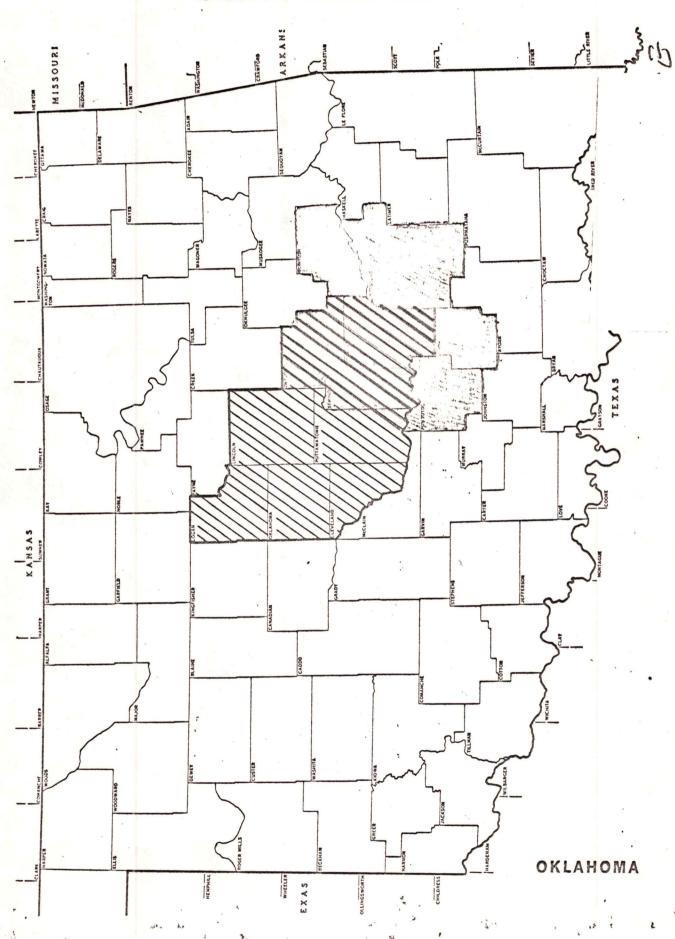
