Dear Mr. Albert:

In reference to previous correspondence, I am pleased to advise you of the selection of Mr. Calvin C. Beames for the position of Area Executive Officer of the PHS Indian Health Area Office, Oklahoma City.

I have given considerable deliberation and thought to the filling of this position. Mr. Beames has fully demonstrated ability to work with the Oklahoma Area Indians, understands their problems and needs, and has worked for a number of years on the professional health side of the Indian health program. A brief resume of Mr. Beames' background follows:

He was born in Kingston, Oklahoma, and is a member of the Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma. He possesses a Baccalaureate Degree from Oklahoma South-eastern College at Durant and a Masters Degree from Highlands University of New Mexico. He taught public school in Oklahoma for four years, then spent fifteen years as a teacher and guidance counselor for the Bureau of Indian Affairs. He subsequently joined the Division of Indian Health and for eight years worked as a health educator. The past two years he has served with considerable distinction as the Area Tribal Affairs Officer for the Oklahoma Area Office of the Division of Indian Health. Mr. Beames is well known all over the Oklahoma Area by all Indians, both tribal leaders and others.

We appreciate your continued interest and support of the Indian health program.
