Certainly, the Indian leaders of our nation should be given a full and free opportunity to express their views on this entire subject.

## RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, The Inter-Tribal Council of the Five Civilized Tribes is established for the purpose of enlightening the public toward a better understanding of the Indian race; to preserve Indian cultural values; to enhance and promote general educational opportunity among members of the Five Civilized Tribes; to seek an equitable adjustment of tribal affairs; to secure and to preserve rights under Indian treaties with the United States; and otherwise to promote the common welfare of the American Indians;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That Honorable Lyndon B. Johnson, our President, and the honorable members of the Congress of the United States be informed that this representative body and the Indians they represent have had no opportunity to make known their views in respect to the proposal to transfer the Bureau of Indian Affairs from the Department of the Interior to the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That their historic treaty relationships to the Government is unlike that of any other segment of the American people, and their claim for consideration and sympathy has never rested upon the basis of charity, but upon treaties of cessions which provide ample justification for a wholly different treatment of their people than that which underlies the remedial actions undertaken by the United States to solve the economic and social problems of other citizens;

THAT the Department of the Interior from long experience is better fitted to continue to discharge the obligations of trust which the United States has assumed in the management of Indian affairs, including their land, minerals, timber and other valuable resources; and this responsibility should not be transferred to any other Department without the Indians' knowledge and consent and especially such interests should be withheld from the hands of social experimenters until all essential facts are known.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the President and the members of the Oklahoma Congressional delegation be and they are hereby most respectfully urged to hold a public conference on the proposal of transfer of said Bureau and that the Indian leaders of this Nation be given a full and free opportunity to express their views on the entire subject, including the source of the proposal.
