Notification to Members of Congress

Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (P.L. 89-10) Title III,  
Supplementary Educational Centers and Services

Under the above authority, the U.S. Office of Education has approved 49 projects which had been placed in the "Hold" category pending program negotiations. These projects are in addition to the 454 announced since November 14, 1966 (notification date for the first approval period of Fiscal Year 1967), and may involve an expenditure of \$8,426,091 in Federal grant funds.

Title III authorizes use of Federal funds to assist local schools in providing sufficient quantity or quality and in developing or establishing exemplary school programs to serve as models for regular programs.

The U.S. Office of Education is notifying each local educational agency of the approval and approval conditions of its projects.

Attached is a listing by State of the local educational agencies whose projects have been approved for support.

NOTE: The dollar amounts listed for each project, in most instances, are the amounts requested by the applicant and are indicated in this notice for information purposes only. They should not be construed as a final Federal commitment of funds. Such a commitment will be made only after negotiation and execution of grant awards.

Amount Sought: \$8,553

Description: During a two-month summer program a curriculum unit on Indian culture will be developed by potential dropouts from 41 counties. The program is designed to help children from bilingual homes who do not relate well with each other, and who need to improve their self-image and skill in oral communication of English as a second language. Research conducted by them for the study unit will provide experience to help overcome these deficiencies. The unit will be incorporated into the regular school curriculum.

Counties served: Nowata, Rogers, Mayes, Craig, Ottawa, Delaware, Washington, Wagoner, Cherokee, Adair, Sequoyah, Tulsa, Creek, Okmulgee, Okfuskee, McIntosh, Muskogee, Seminole, Pontotoc, Coal, Pittsburg, Hughes, Pushmataha, Choctaw, McCurtain, Latimer, Haskell, LeFlore, Grady, Stephens, Jefferson, McClain, Garvin, Murray, Carter, Love, Johnston, Marshall, Atoka, Bryan, Pawhuska
