

Status of Housing Program

Following is the status of projects located in the Third Congressional District represented by the Hon. Carl Albert:

Low-Rent Projects:

Talihina Township Project (OKLA-49-2) - 30 units have been authorized by the Housing Assistance Administration, including 4 units specifically designed for elderly occupancy. The Annual Contributions Contract has been executed between the Choctaw Housing Authority and the government. The schematic design plans prepared by Hudgins, Thompson, Ball and Associates have been approved and that firm is now authorized to prepare the final construction drawings.

<u>Wright City Project</u> - McCurtain County - 84 units were requested by the Choctaw Housing Authority on December 16, 1966. The preliminary inspection by the Program Section of the Housing Assistance Administration has been made, and we have unofficially received a favorable report on this project; however, no allotment of units has been made by the Housing Assistance Administration.

<u>Caney Project</u> - Atoka County - 60 units were requested by the Choctaw Housing Authority in an application submitted to the Housing Assistance Administration on May 18, 1967.

Quinton Project - Pittsburg County - 85 units were requested by the Choctaw Housing Authority in an application submitted to the Housing Assistance Administration on May 8, 1967.

Red Oak Township Project - Latimer County - 60 units were applied for by the Choctaw Housing Authority on July 20, 1967.

<u>Tishomingo Project</u> (OKLA-47-2), Johnston County - 24 units were approved by the Housing Assistance Administration including 6 specially designed for elderly occupancy. The Development Program has been held up pending recertification of the Workable Program for Community Improvement of the Chickasaw Tribe. Site locations have been made and as soon as the Workable Program is recertified the Fort Worth office of the Housing Assistance Administration will make a site inspection and the Development Program can be prepared.



Mutual-Help Projects:

Mountain Township Project (OKLA-49-1), near Smithville in McCurtain County - 30 units have been approved for construction by the Housing Assistance Administration. The Annual Contributions Contract has been executed between the Housing Assistance Administration and the Choctaw Housing Authority, and a contract is being prepared with the International Basic Economy Corporation to construct these units under a turnkey proposal. It is hoped that construction can be under way within 6 weeks. A request for an additional 15 units in this same area was made to the Housing Assistance Administration on April 18, 1967.

Stringtown, Ti, and Tuskahoma Twps. Project, in the corner of Atoka, Pittsburg and Pushmataha Counties - 15 units have been approved by the Housing Assistance Administration. (Project No. OKLA-49-3).

Alderson, Bucklucksy, Cabaness Twps. and McAlester City Project, Pittsburg County - 30 units were requested from the Housing Assistance Administration by the Choctaw Housing Authority on February 9, 1967.

Beaver, Center, Diamond and San Bois Twps. Project, Haskell County - 45 units were requested from the Housing Assistance Administration by the Choctaw Housing Authority on February 21, 1967.

Bennington and Lakewest Twps. in Bryan County, and Hunter and Oakes Twps. in Choctaw County - 35 units were requested from the Housing Assistance Administration by the Choctaw Housing Authority on December 15, 1966.

<u>Sulphur, Eagle and Wilson Twps. Project</u> - McCurtain County - 45 units were requested from the Housing Assistance Administration by the Choctaw Housing Authority on November 17, 1966.

Frisco, Kirk and White Twps. Project - McCurtain County - 38 units were requested from the Housing Assistance Administration by the Choctaw Housing Authority on April 18, 1967.

Jeter, Ratliff and Everidge Twps. and the City of Hugo - Choctaw County - 38 units were requested from the Housing Assistance Administration by the Choctaw Housing Authority on January 30, 1967.

Conversations with the Housing Assistance Administration at Fort Worth indicate that they will give the Housing Authority of the Choctaw Nation substantially the number of units requested as soon as construction is under way on the 30 units approved in Mountain Township.

Thomas and Myrick Twps. Project (OKLA-47-1) in the Milburn area of Johnston County - The Housing Authority of the Chickasaw Nation has 14 Mutual-Help units approved and the Annual Contributions Contract has been executed.

Additional requests for Program Reservations in Pontotoc and Murray Counties are being prepared by the Chickasaw Housing Authority.

In addition to the above described projects located in the Third Congressional District, the following is the status of projects located in the Second Congressional District represented by the Hon. Ed Edmondson:

Low-Rent Projects:

<u>Pryor Project</u> (OKLA-45-1) - 25 houses formerly belonging to the Oklahoma Ordnance Works Authority have been purchased by the Housing Authority of the Cherokee Nation, and plans are now in the Housing Assistance Administration, Fort Worth, to renovate these houses. It is hoped that they can be occupied within the next 90 to 120 days.

Tahlequah Project (OKLA-45-2) - 16 units have been approved for construction by the Housing Assistance Administration. The schematic design plans have been made by the firm of Hudgins, Thompson, Ball and Associates and a conference to approve these plans has been set with the Housing Authority of the Cherokee Nation and the Fort Worth office of the Housing Assistance Administration on September 21. Pending approval of the schematic drawings, this firm will prepare the working drawings for letting the contract on this project.

Jay Project - Delaware County - The Housing Authority of the Cherokee Nation has requested 60 units by application submitted to the Housing Assistance Administration on January 20, 1967. The Program Section of the Housing Assistance Administration, Fort Worth, has made a site inspection and they have assured us by telephone that an early allocation of units will be made in this area.

<u>Eufaula Project</u> (OKLA-51-1) - McIntosh County - The Housing Authority of the Creek Nation has received an allocation of 20 units to be constructed on tribal land at Eufaula. The Annual Contributions Contract has been approved. The schematic design of the project is complete and the architectural firm of Hudgins, Thompson, Ball and Associates has been authorized to complete the working drawings so that construction may begin at an early date.

Mutual-Help Projects:

Baron and Wauhillau Twps in Adair County; and Briggs Twp. in Cherokee County - These 2 projects have been approved for a total of 26 units. The Annual Contributions Contract between the Housing Authority of the Cherokee Nation and the Housing Assistance Administration has been approved and the Housing Authority has entered into a contract with the International Basic Economy Corporation to construct these units on a turnkey proposal. Construction has been started - 7 foundations and floors have been poured and the masonry work has been started.

Brewer, Harris, McLain, Martin, Nash, Porum, and Vann Twps, in eastern Muskogee County - 35 units were requested from the Housing Assistance Administration by the Housing Authority of the Cherokee Nation on August 29, 1967.

Several additional projects located in Adair, Cherokee and Haskell Counties are being prepared by the Housing Authority of the Cherokee Nation for presentation to the Housing Assistance Administration early in September.

<u>Burton-Hanna Project</u>, McIntosh County - The Housing Authority of the Creek Nation has received an allocation of 15 mutual-help homes. The Annual Contributions Contract for this project has been approved and the Bureau is now assisting participants in clearing up their land titles. The Housing Authority is considering changing this project from a standard Mutual-Help concept to a turnkey proposal.

Yeager Township Project - Hughes County - The Housing Authority of the Creek Nation has been allocated 12 units in this area. The Annual Contributions Contract has been approved and the participants are now clearing their land titles so that construction can begin. This Housing Authority is considering, as above, changing this from a standard Mutual-Help to a turn-key type construction.

Additional projects in Creek, McIntosh, Hughes, Okmulgee, Okfuskee and Tulsa Counties are being prepared and will be presented to the Housing Assistance Administration early in September.

FUNDS AND PERSONNEL NEEDED TO ACCOMPLISH THE HOUSING PROGRAM

3) We do not have Real Property personnel at the Five Civilized Tribes Agency Field Offices. We are in need of the 5 Realty Specialists and 5 Clerk-Stenographer positions which have been requested in the Real Property Management budget for the Five Civilized Tribes during the past several years. Particularly is this need upon us now with the developments in the housing program. Due to the Five Civilized Tribes legislative history as to land, the complexities of the land titles and jurisdiction cannot be overstated, with county courts having some jurisdiction, Bureau of Indian Affairs having some jurisdiction and not having established and maintained in the past, land records for program use, presumably on the premise that 25 years after allotment there would be no Indian land to supervise or involved in programs. Insofar as land is concerned, there has been and is a void in education of the public (Indian, non-Indian and even Bureau personnel) on the legislative history and complexities of Indian land titles and jurisdiction.

While we do not anticipate all the personnel requisitioned, we have IMMEDIATE need for at least two people for the next three years, to devote full time to the housing program to accomplish the following:

- 1. Review and analyze housing reports on participants.
- Determine status of title restricted or unrestricted, researching and examining Bureau of Indian Affairs, Field Solicitors and County records.
- 3. Determine title information to be ordered, and place orders for abstracts.
- 4. Request heirship determinations by providing proofs of heirship showing complete estate information and presumptive heirs, including an inventory of property.
- Prepare all instruments (a) deeds for conveyance to the participants (b) deeds of conveyance to the Housing Authority,
 - (c) removals of restrictions (d) Ingress and Egress Permits,
 - (e) easement deeds for access rights-of-way and (f) escrow agreement.

Estimated funds in the amount of \$50,000 per year for immediate personnel and title information is needed for this and the next two years.

IV. BRANCH OF ROADS

Talihina - Bengal Road

Work started on the grading and drainage of the Red Oak to Bengal Road in November, 1966. The estimated cost of grading, drainage, gravel base, and four reinforced concrete box culverts is \$169,000 of which \$89,000 was programed in F.Y. 1967 and \$80,000 during F.Y. 1968. The length of the project is 6.3 miles. A contract was awarded for the construction of the four reinforced concrete boxes at a cost of \$24,389. A contract was awarded June 30, 1967 for the construction of the Long Creek bridge at contract price of \$66,291,52. Total estimated cost of grading, drainage, gravel base, four concrete box culverts and the Long Creek bridge is \$235,291.

The bituminous surfacing of this project and the road from Bengal to Talihina is scheduled for F.Y. 1971.

The three and one half mile section of road from Red-Oak to a connection with the Bureau Road is on the Federal Aid Secondary Road System and is not scheduled for improvement with Indian Bureau Funds. Some improvements have already been made on this road under the FAS program including a bridge over the Fourche Maline Creek.

- 1. Tribal Facilities for the Seminole Tribe at Wewoka Oklahoma Project sponsored by the Wewoka Chamber of Commerce and others. Our FTO Office at Littleton has received approval to assist in the planning and design phases of this facility. A meeting is tentatively being considered to convene in September for further discussion and formulation of the plans.
- 2. Carter Seminary The dormitory facilities are in the final draft phase of the plans and specifications and are being reviewed with an anticipated bid date of November 1967.
- 3. Eufaula Dormitory; plans are being drawn for this facility with plans and specifications complete and ready for bid by the spring of 1968.
- 4. Jones Academy Jones Academy facility are badly in need of the construction of a Multi-purpose Building to provide recreation space, additional office space, barber shop and other use areas for the students at Jones Academy.
- 5. Wheelock Academy continues to deteriorate and due to lack of available funds no definite repairs and maintenance program or utilization of these facilities has been formulated.

SUBJECT: Status of the Choctaw Crafts Program per the request of the

Area Director.

The goals of the Choctaw Crafts program are the same as the goals of the Sequoyah Weavers or the Cherokee Crafts Center. They want to train as many Choctaws in their area to support their own retail crafts outlet. If there are surpluses of first quality crafts, the Cherokee Crafts Center will purchase their excess for wholesaling. The beautiful thing about the training process is that the weaver is able to realize some income while he becomes skilled.

DATE: August 31, 1967

At the present time, there are 23 members of the Chahta Indian Arts and Crafts Association of Idabel chartered by the State of Oklahoma on May 2, 1967. At Wright City there are 16 Choctaws and 11 at Eagletown that are ready for classes but are not chartered yet.

With the completion of the lakes now under construction in the Choctaw area will afford great opportunities for the craftsmen to get a share of the tourist dollar that will be drawn to that area. This share will contribute greatly to the economic conditions of the individuals and the local area.

The needs of the program are the same as any program - money, personnel, equipment and facilities. However, we have somehow managed to find the facilities when the projects became a cooperative effort of the entire community.

The present staff of the Arts & Crafts Branch consists of one director and two instructors. The territory covered is the Five Civilized Tribes area in Oklahoma and the Choctaw Area in the State of Mississippi. We have been able to hire one crafts aid on a temporary basis in Mississippi.

SUBJECT: Pending projects - Southeastern Oklahoma

Choctaw Indian Village:

The Pittsburg County Historical Association, McAlester, Oklahoma, has selected a site at the entrance of Arrowhead State Park for construction of a Choctaw Indian Village. Directors of the Association are negotiating with Professor John York, Oklahoma University, Norman, who will develop plans for the project.

The overall project calls for a pioneer house, complete with relics of earlier days, a museum and Indian village. Portions of the land would be turned into a fenced in habitat for wild animals for this section of Oklahoma.

The Historical Association must secure a survey of the required 160 acres before further steps can be taken.

On-the-Job Training Program with Oklahoma Aerotronics, Inc., Hartshorne, Oklahoma:

The Muskogee Area Office of the Bureau of Indian Affairs is negotiating an On-the-Job Training Program with Oklahoma Aerotronics, Inc., in Hartshorne, Oklahoma. Company officials have indicated they want to hire and train 15 Indian employees. Current employment at the plant is approximately 180. This company manufactures printed circuits, identification plates, and does metal fabrication, precision machining, offset printing, etc.

Negotiations are expected to be completed when funds become available.

The Muskogee Area Office of the Bureau of Indian Affairs has worked with several industrial prospects for the Southeastern Oklahoma area during the past three or four years and has succeeded in locating Durant Electronics, a toy manufacturing firm, in Durant. Results in other areas are anticipated.
