

WHEREAS, the population of Ottawa County, Oklahoma is comprised of a large number of persons of Indian descent; and

WHEREAS, the Seneca Indian School with an enrollment in excess of two hundred twenty-five children is located at Wyandotte, Oklahoma; and

WHEREAS, there are many hundreds of school children of Indian descent attending other schools in Ottawa County, Oklahoma; and

WHEREAS, the medical needs of the Indian families and Indian children in Ottawa County, Oklahoma are acute because of the unavailability of doctors, medical clinics and hospitals; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Indian tribes of Ottawa County, Oklahoma to call to the attention of the United States Department of Interior and the United States Public Health Service these dire and critical needs.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE INDIAN TRIBES OF OTTAWA COUNTY, OKLAHOMA that these critical and dire needs be and are hereby brought to the attention of the United States Department of Interior and the United States Public Health Service, and these agencies be and are hereby requested to take action to alleviate this problem.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the United States Department of Interior, the United States Public Health Service, and to United States Senators Fred Harris and Mike Monroney, and United States Representative Ed Edmondson.
