

Dear Mr. Whitekiller:

Your June 24, 1975, letter to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs has been referred to my office for response.

Based on the information in your letter, the Horton Agency in Kansas was correct in denying your grant request since your proposed business endeavor would not be on or near an Indian reservation. Section 401 of the Indian Financing Act of 1974 restricts grants under the Indian Business Development Program to "profit-making, Indian-owned economic enterprises on or near reservations." Section 3(d) of the Act defines reservation to include "Indian reservations, public domain Indian allotments, former Indian reservations in Oklahoma, and land held by incorporated Native groups, regional corporations, and village corporations under the provisions of the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act."

We have no latitude or discretion as you suggest in your letter, because the wording in the Act, "on or near reservations," is quite explicit. It was the intent of Congress in passing this legislation to promote the economic development of reservations.
