TRIBUIL SISPS DIE MUKING Tribal Lana Sales Legal

WASHINGTON, July 3 (AP)—President Truman today signed a measure to make legal sale of certain lands by Indians of the "Five Civilized Tribes" of Oklahoma during the past 15 years.

These were instances where the Indians bought land with restricted money (held in trust by the government) and thus had legal title, but resold the land without the required permission of the secretary of the interior. The measure legalizes the latter transactions.
