The bill in question passed the House a few days ago and it is too late to get this matter before the House sub-committee, under which circumstances you requested me to send it to Senator Carl Hayden, which I am doing today. My dear Senator Hayden:

I enclose herewith a letter which I received this morning from the Assistant Chief and the Secretary of the Osage Tribal Council of Osage Indians in Oklahoma, with attached Resolution No. 16h adopted by the Council April 17th, and two petitions signed by a number of Osage Tribesmen.

I anticipate that you understand that a number of the members of the Council were here several weeks ago and appeared personally before the sub-committee of the House Committee on Appropriations handling the Interior Bill, and protested the inclusion of a number of items affecting the Osage Indians in Oklahoma. After they returned home, according to information I received from them, pressure was brought to bear by agents of the Superintendent's Office at Pawhuska, Oklahoma, seeking to have them withdraw their protests and adopt the resolution of April 17th. The Assistant Chief and some others refused to sign the resolution, as I am informed, and think that their protests here were proper and that the items they objected to should be deleted from the bill. However, the matter had passed the sub-committee's consideration and, in fact, the bill had passed the House before I received the enclosed letter of May 13 this morning. You will note that they anticipated that such would be true, from the notation on the bottom of the letter which I am referring to you.
