RATIVES WIN

Fred Lookout Remains Chief As Newest Indian Party Gets Power

The newly organized Osage Indian Co-operative party won a clean cut victory over three opposing parties as Fred Lookout of Pawhuska was again elected principal chief of the tribe by an overwhelming majority in Monday's election. Frank Shaw of Fairfax will replace J. E. Whitehorn of Tulsa as assistant chief.

Lookout, who has served as chief consistently since 1924, received 643 of the 884 votes cast. Shaw received 146, more than twice the number received by his two opponents, John Whitehorn and Ira Hamilton combined.

The eight elected councilmen and the number of votes each received are: Dave Ware, 627, Dick Petsenoie, 464, both of Bartlesville; Paul Pitts of Hominy, 478; Joe Mason of Fairfax, 559; Ed Simpkins, 596, Joe Revelette, 531; G. V. Labadie, 477, and Charles Carter, 400, all of Pawhuska.

Simpkins and Pitts were the only council members re-elected.

This is the first year that general voting by absentee ballot was permitted. Over 300 were absentee votes. This type of vote has previously been permitted to members of the armed forces only.

The Cooperative party, organized by G. V. Labadie in January 1946, held their convention in March of this year at which time their ticket was nominated. This is the first year that all offices have been filled by nominees of one ticket.

The defeat was one of the most crushing that has ever been recorded in the history of Osage elections. When interviewed, Labadie, organizer of the cooperative party, stated that the elected representatives of his party would cooperate fully and will inaugurate several programs that will be for the benefit of the tribe.
