Dear Senator:

By mail today I received a copy of the Indian Settlement Bill with the Indians from my friend O. K. Chandler. He sent me a copy of his letter to you regarding said bill.

My wife and I have read this bill carefully and his letter about it. I am enrolled as seven-eighths Indaian and my wife one-eighth. All of my brothers and sisters are enrolled as full bloods. But no matter how we are enrolled the government does nothing for us. As indians we have nothing to do with it (the government) and they have nothing to do with us.

What the Indian bureau gets for protecting us is clear profit to the bureau; we cost them absolutely nothing. I cant see why Congress gives money to that bureau for doing things it fails to do or try to do.

Now, as I read this bill, it will do away with the Indian Bureau and make final settlement with the I dians-giving them what belongs to them—that will clean up the whole mess. For that reason I am strictly for the bill, am writing you at Mr. Chandler's suggestion after a careful study of the bill. I approve it and hope you will lend us your efforts.
