Dear Sir:

The National economic condition has in my opinion become intolerable because of the irresponsible actions of labor leaders in the many strikes since VJ Day.

When any group is granted by law and its interpretation a monopoly on supplying necessary services and products to the public then their actions should be regulated so that the public interest is not endangered. The CIO Steelworkers union, the United Mine Workers Union as well as many others certainly have a monopoly on supplying the labor necessary to very vital element of national economy.

Therefore I suggest that you throw your entire weight behind a national law, to wit:

1. Make all labor unions responsible.
  - (a) Incorporation
  - (b) Subject to all corporate taxes.
  - (c) Subject to suits in civil court for breaking of contracts.
  - (d) Unions controlling a natural resource such as, Coal, Oil, Lumber etc, must be further restricted from striking.
    1. If necessary national laws must be created to protect people in these industries from exploitation.

I am sure that you want our country to get back to normalcy and prosperity. This can not be done unless you do something in the way of labor legislation to help out.
