I am just in receipt of your letter of the 5th instant and was delighted to hear from you.

I noted what you have to say about the labor situation and I think your views are sound. However, this New Deal crowd has been appeasing the labor racketeers and union bosses for the past thirteen years to the point where they almost control the country, and seem to care little or nothing about the general public, which is most vitally affected and numerically far in the majority.

My humble opinion is that in the long run, labor will suffer most from the appeasement policy of the New Deal Administration, and the rank and file of labor is to be pitied, rather than condemned. But I do condemn most vehemently the labor racketeers.
