Dear Mr. Schwabe:

As an operator of a "small business" in your state, I hope you will be interested in my thinking as regards the industrial strife that is now threatening the reconversion program of our country.

The demands made by UAW-CIO on General Motors for excessive wages on the basis of ability to pay are alarming to me, because such a policy would sooner or later result in all wages being set by a political board on the basis of its guess on future operations; and we in "small business" would be regimented to the point where our initiative and our future would be seriously jeopardized.

I hope you will not support legislation that would legalize such demands.

This country's unfortunate situation is most clearly brought out in the speech of Honorable E. H. Moore in the Senate on Thursday, November 8, 1945.

I urge that you support legislation that will give our country a fair and just labor policy. I believe this can be accomplished by the 8-point program proposed by the Senator.
