Dear Congressman Schwabe:

I feel very strongly that immediate steps should be taken to correct the present situation in regard to strikes. It is my feeling that two things should be done:

- (1) The employees should be held legally responsible for carrying out contracts they have made with their employers and Unions should be liable for damages due to strikes and labor disturbances contrary to contractual commitments.
- (2) Strikes should be completely outlawed and severe penalties should be imposed upon anyone attempting to instigate a strike under any circumstances.

I realize that there is a great deal of discussion on this subject at the present time and undoubtedly, considerable difference of opinion as to what should be done; therefore, I am passing this on to you with the hope that my thoughts may be considered, together with those of other people who contact you, and will assist you in backing suitable legislation to correct the present situation.
