

Dear Representative Schwabe:

In the latter part of March, this Company signed a stipulation with the C. I. O. Union and the Teamsters Union to allow the employees to vote on a question, whether or not they should be represented by the C. I. O. Union, Teamsters Union, or by no union.

The election was held under the auspices of the National Labor Relations Board on April 9th. The result of the election was that the C. I. O. Union received no votes. The employees of the above company voted two-to-one against any union.

The Teamsters Union served notice on us that, if we did not sign a contract with the Teamsters Union, they would picket our plant. May 13th, the Teamsters Union started picketing us, thus denying us of any deliveries, or shipments by truck. The pickets are now endeavoring to turn back all trucks that may approach our shipping docks. In other words, the Teamsters Union are trying to force our employees to join their union, whether or not it is their wish.

What steps are you taking to pass a bill that will eliminate such conditions?
