Dear Miss Canon:

I am just in receipt of your very interesting letter of October 1, with reference to the attitude of the boys in the service toward the labor agitators and racketeers and the strikes that are going on in this country today.

I was especially interested in noting that you say the boys in the service are by orders kept from writing to their Representatives in Congress. I have had several other letters containing this same information, and I have taken occasion to condemn such orders and shall continue until I hope this type of order will be revoked and the boys permitted to write to their Congressmen.

I think your line of reasoning is clear and convincing, and it is from such letters that I am inspired to continue my fight against bureaucracy that has established such a stranglehold upon Americans and our activities in this country. I don't want a military bureaucracy or any other sort of bureaucracy, and I have called upon the President to get rid of these emergency bureaus which were created, as they told us, only as war emergency bureaus. Many of them were created by Executive Orders of the President and can be abolished by such Executive Orders. I am also interested in having Congress abolish many of the bureaus it created.

Again thanking you for the benefit of your thinking and assuring you that such letters are appreciated and help me to report the reactions of my constituents with more enthusiasm, I beg to remain

Dear Mr Schwabe:

As a registered voter in your district and as a veteran of the Women's Army Corp, I am writing to ask that you support any action that can be taken against the labor leaders or unions that are calling strikes in so many industries. Even though this is not a strike area, the effects of such strikes influence us all.

Knowing first hand the pay schedules of men in the army, and the way they are kept by orders from writing to representatives, these men feel they are being let down by us at home if we allow strikes and higher wages while they continue to draw small pay. Many of these wish they had the opportunity to work for the wage that labor gets now, without demanding additional pay.
