I have your letter of the 5th instant with reference to the Case Bill, and note what you have to say.

I assure you that no pressure groups have any claims on me. I vote as I think best for the people of this country, regardless of what any pressure group may have to say. As a general rule, the pressure groups have not supported me, and I have no reason to cater to them.

You suggest that the passage of some constructive legislation would be a good thing. I agree with you; but you must remember that the majorities in both Houses of Congress are Democrats and are apparently bent upon continuing the program that has been going on for the past thirteen years. They will not permit any constructive legislation to be passed unless it is in furtherance of the program that has been under way during the last few years.
