My dear Mrs. Morrow:

I have your letter of February 4th voicing your protest against the strikes.

I am one of those who have no fault to find with labor or organized labor so long as it is not headed by a bunch of racketeers with un-American principles, trying to bunch of racketeers with un-American principles, trying to use a minority of our people to control a majority in this use a minority of our people to control a majority in this country. I note you favor the retention of the OPA. Unfortunately, the OPA is operating under the philosophy of scarcity rather than abundance. They have curtailed production. What we need is full production. There is no danger of over production. They want to regulate everything we eat, wear, say and tion.
