I have your letter of the 12th instant, relative to the Case Bill. Now Senator, your first guess should be right. I voted "aye" on the bill the first time it was voted upon in the House, then I voted to override the President's veto of the Case Bill. I am ready to do this all over again, and of course, I have incurred the everlasting disfavor of the CIO, labor union bosses and racketeers. But, they never appealed to me anyway. Their programs have been so un-American, domineering and against the best interests of the rank and file of labor itself, that I have always refused to go along with them on their extreme measures. I agree with you that they seem to have a dominating influence over Mr. Truman. I think he let Congress down and the American people down when he vetoed the Case Bill. He simply does not want any permanent labor legislation enacted by this Congress, and he wants to wait until after the new Congress comes here with the hope that he will have a House which the labor unions and he can dictate to.
