Dear George:

I have not changed my mind one bit. I still believe that something must be done to even up Capital and Labor's responsibility to the Public. I doubt, seriously, that curbing Labor's right to strike would help....it might eventually bring curbs on Capital that would hurt all of us a lot.

As I understand the Wagner Act, Industry's hands are tied. This is wrong. Labor has come of age, and should be given the same responsibility toward the public as Industry. Labor should ~~be~~ ^{be} made, by proper Law, ~~be~~ brought to a realization of its legal responsibility. Industry ~~is~~ hog-tied. Industry cannot, under the Wagner Law, try to show its employees the difference between right and wrong, without violating the law. I maintain that the Law should be fair to all people, all groups, and not favor, to the very least extent, any individual or group.


