I have your most interesting letter of the 24th instant.

First, I want to thank you for your interest, your patriotism, and giving me the benefit of your thinking. In my judgment, your line of reasoning is cogent, convincing and unanswerable. You seem to have a better graspe of the trend than the average person does. Most everyone knows that there is something wrong, but too many are unable to put their finger on the spot and diagnose the cause of the catastrophe.

In my humble opinion, labor racketeers and labor bosses do not represent the best interests of labor. They seem to represent their own selfish interests and are interested in self-perpetuation of their power and claim to exert tremendous influence politically. I think their actions too frequently are not regardful of the rights and best interests of the public; and to that extent, they may be considered as enemies of the people. They have been petted, pampered and spoiled by this administration, and I am in favor of laws that will hold them to strict accountability and make them think twice before they put the public in such jeapardy in the future.
