My dear Mrs. Arthur:

I want to thank you for your most considerate and kind letter of the 15th instant. I fear I do not deserve all the compliments you paid me, but I am inspired by the encouragement you offer. It is inspiring to anyone to feel that he, as a public official, has the confidence of his friends and constituents. I have known of your sincerity and loyalty through the years, and you know that I have always appreciated them.

It is a difficult fight to keep this New Deal crowd from giving everything we have away to foreigners, and I make no apologies for standing by the homefolks. I am an American and think that Americans deserve and should be given full consideration.

It might be of interest to you to know that the people of my District have written me, in one way or another, several thousand of them, that they are against this loan to Britain and the giving of our substance to foreign governments, and only a very few have written in favor of it. I know this does not coincide with the propaganda of the League of Women Voters put out by the New Deal crowd here at Washington, but the expression of individual members like you is generally in line with the tremendous majority of the people, and their thinking is overwhelmingly against the loan.

Again assuring you of my sincere appreciation of your letter, and trusting that you will understand that I am not to be persuaded by any New Deal propaganda, but that I want to represent the genuine and worthwhile interests of our people, I am
