Dear Mr. McCutchan:

I was very pleased to receive your letter of February 11th expressing yourself with reference to the big-heartedness or the fool-heartedness of the present Administration toward foreign countries, especially with reference to the spending of money and making of loans or gifts to the foreign Governments. I would have answered your letter sooner, but I have had about all I could do to handle the correspondence with my own constituents. However, your letter is refreshing and encouraging. It serves to let me know that the people of your District, as well as mine, are thinking for themselves and are overwhelmingly opposed to the British Loan and to a lot of other things that are happening from Washington today.

I might suggest to you that I think I know pretty well the attitude of the serviceman and the veterans of World War II. I have four sons, all of whom were in the service and who speak plainly as do most of the other boys when you have a heart to heart talk with them. It is the rarest exception when I have found one who is in favor of our continued extravagance and silly beneficence toward the world.

I am glad you wrote me, but I would appreciate it if you would write your own Congressman and give him freely and emphatically your views on this subject for I am sure that he thinks as I do on this subject or will vote as I shall.
