Dear Friends:

I have your letter of February 28th asking me to support the proposed British loan.

I have received a few other letters requesting me to support an appropriation for this loan. However, I recently sent Questionnaires indiscriminately to 40,000 people in my District asking them what I should do about this matter. They have answered over ten to one against my supporting the loan. Sentiment throughout the country, so far as I can find out, is overwhelmingly against the measure. What would you do under such circumstances?

Frankly I have never been convinced that we should make the loan. I am still open-minded on the subject and subject to conviction. I am afraid it will not be what the proponents say it will be. This is not the way our transactions with England have worked in the past and we certainly have a right to judge the future by the past. From what I can understand the British do not have any serious hopes that we will make them the loan.
