I recently had a talk with a discharged soldier who told me that in North Africa, Jews were handling this "Lead-Lease" stuff and holding up our own soldiers. Of course, you know my opinion of Official Washington as it is now, but is nt there somthing that Congress can do to stop all the damned silly "relief" that Mr. Lehman is handling? If I had my way, every one of our soldiers would be brought home from Europe tomorrow and that bunch could rustle their own grum.
