Sir:-

The following photo-static copy, and explanation are offered to you, as evidence to refute the claim that England should be given a non-collateral gift loan in order to stimulate or open up free world trade.

The evidence proves that in the past, England was painfully careful to exclude even a dollar and a half import in August of 1941.

No one can foolishly believe a gift loan No. 11, would change England, who has a natural talent for excluding American trade.

The previously defaulted loan No. 1 of World War 1, to England and other countries failed miserably to open up free world trade then, It did, however, brand us as uncouth, conniving shylocks.

The following is the evidence and photo-static copy which I offer:

In August 1941, I received a \$1.50 order from N. H. Woolery, Esq., Bethel Town, P.O. Jamaica, British West Indies. He in turn tried to obtain permission to allow the merchandise to enter his country. The Imports, Exports & Price Board of Kingston, sent N. H. Woolery, the attached refusal.

We, as Americans, should try to solve some of our own problems, such as the further pyramiding of our national debt, and the subsequent devaluing of our life savings.
