Dear Mr. Schwabe:

Your favorable vote is urged on the bill for the British loan of \$3,750,000,000. It may seem like a sacrifice now, but over a period of time I believe it will be beneficial to us, and for the following reasons:

1. Britain may use this money on purchase of only U.S. goods, according to agreement.
2. She has promised to abolish the system of blocked sterling and the dollar-pool thus permitting her "areas of influence" to trade freely with us.
3. She promises to avoid discriminations against importing U.S. goods to Britain.
4. She agrees to cooperate on a principle of multilateral world trade.
5. Freer trade is absolutely necessary for world peace, and if we make this loan we will be instrumental in making peace a certainty.
