Dear Mr. Schwabe:


My attention has been called to the "Merchant Seamen's Bill of Rights," H. R. 2346. While I do not have any first-hand knowledge of this bill I would favor legislation to give merchant seamen serving during the present conflict a status equal with those in the armed forces. I have every confidence in Admiral Land and I do not believe we shall go far wrong if we enact legislation sponsored by him with the above purpose in mind.

I am glad to note that President Truman has shown an inclination to cooperate with our Congress during his administration and I hope it will mean that we shall once more have a truly representative and constitutional form of government.
