Dear Commander Tuttle: I am just in receipt of your letter of March 21st relative to H. R. 2346, again reminding me that your Post is opposed to granting to members of the Merchant Marines similar benefits to those granted under the G. I. Bill of Rights to veterans of the Army, Navy and other Armed Forces of this country. You are right in stating that renewed efforts have been made and renewed pressure is being attempted upon Members of Congress to pass this or some similar measure. But I am still of the opinion that the Merchant Marines are not entitled to the same wonsideration that the Members of the Armed Forces are. I know in many instances boys went into the Merchant Marines voluntarily and in order to avoid service in the Armed Forces. They must have had a good reason for doing so, and especially those who went into the Merchant Marines later or did so with the full knowledge that the G. I. Bill of Rights did not apply to them. I have many friends among the Merchant Marines and their families and for the present I would appreciate it if you did not give publicity to this letter and my attitude for it would do no good. It would only serve to cause the Merchant Marines people to flood me with a tremendous quantity of mail and besiege me to support this bill. Frankly I do not believe this bill is in any danger of immediate passage, and perhaps will not even be considered seriously at an early date. The House Committee on Merchant Marines and Fisheries to which the bill was referred, has held hearings and the bill was referred to a sub-committee for further study. I understand Representative Peterson of Florida, the author of the bill, is Chairman of this sub-committee. No hearings or other action is scheduled. If I obtain any further information as to the progress of this measure I shall try to think to give you the benefit of such information.
