R. 1831. I have done everything I could up to date, and shall continue to use every effort possible to assist Mr. Stewart in the passage of his bill, or one as nearly like it as possible. I have always contended that there should be only two qualifications to entitle a person to Old Age Assistance. First, he should have attained the required age; and second, he must be a citizen of the United States. It does not take a lot of snoopers to find out these two facts; and after they are determined, we do not need any snoopers for any further work. However, the Administration at Oklahoma City seems to be bent upon having investigators, or snoopers as I call them, in every community, trying to embarrass and befuddle the people and make the older people feel that they are objects of charity or paupers; and I don't like it a bit. All of our Congressional delegation from Oklahoma agreed upon the Stewart Bill except Congressman Monroney of Oklahoma City, who wanted some qualifying clauses in it which would give the politicians a chance to continue as investigators, and they always get a part of the money which should be paid to the old people.
